Our Vision For Universal Child Care

The Empire State Campaign for Child Care (ESCCC) is committed to advocating for a bold, equitable and inclusive **universal** child care system in New York State. As we move toward this goal, we commit to using our collective power to ensure that system reforms and funding reflect this vision, and prioritize the urgent needs of low-income children and families.

We are working toward a child care system that is free of means testing - with no income, immigration status, or parental work/vocation requirements. We envision a child care system that compensates child care educators equitably and adequately, on par with their public school counterparts. We strive to build a system that is culturally-responsive and is coordinated and aligned with the many systems families and children rely upon to thrive - including home visiting, early intervention services, preschool special education, afterschool, and prekindergarten. This system recognizes and funds child care as a public good, not a private service.

The Work To Come: Building on Our Incremental Wins

Free Child Care to All Families with No Barriers

End onerous means testing: Universality removes administrative burdens for families

No copays: Child care is free at point of access for all families

No work or immigration requirements: Child care is not dependent on families' work hours and not

rooted in exclusionary practices that deny care and early education to immigrant children

Expanded uptake: Families are aware of child care assistance available to them, can access it easily, and have ample opportunities for the care and education setting(s) that meet their needs

Dignified Work for Child Care Educators

Compensation: Child care educators are compensated appropriately and sustainably for their important work

Benefits: Child care educators receive health care, paid time off, and retirement benefits

Modernized System that Meets the Needs of All Families

Easy, standardized online application: Mandatory in-person or mail components are eliminated **Unified statewide system:** Currently county discretion only amplifies inequality and confusion

Ample Funding and Support for High Quality Child Care

True cost of care model: Programs are funded to provide high quality care and education, a key component of which is paying the workforce a thriving wage

Additional funding and support: Programs serving families experiencing homelessness, children with disabilities, and/or operating during nontraditional hours are compensated as such

Higher education: Continuing education is accessible and meets the diverse needs of child care educators

Key Victories on the Path to Universal Child Care

Advisory Roles

2021: Release of the Child Care Availability Taskforce Final Report

2022: Reconstitution of the Child Care Availability Taskforce with additional grassroots membership and bold mandate to develop a framework for rolling out universal child care

2024: Release of new report "<u>Making Child Care More Affordable, Accessible and Equitable for New Yorkers</u>" with updated recommendations that include an urgent call for sustained investment in the child care workforce and a commitment to creating a framework for a phased-in rollout of universal child care.

Child Care Work Force Compensation

2024: (Actively advocating) Create a Permanent Child Care Fund to Increase Child Care Worker Compensation. This fund should be sufficient to offer all child care workers who work in licensed, regulated programs compensation parity with similar positions in the public school system

2024: (Actively advocating) Establish Automatic Rate Increase to Child Care Providers, even when that rate exceeds their private tuition price (bill is currently moving through the NYS Legislature)

Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) Eligibility Expansion

2021: Increased to 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) + includes 12 months of eligibility

2022: Increased to 300% FPL + up to 24 month of eligibility option for counties

2022: Promise NYC fund for immigrant children in NYC excluded from child care assistance due to immigration status

2023: Increased to 85% State Median Income (SMI)

2023: Creation of a small statewide pilot program to provide child care assistance to children ineligible for CCAP due to immigration status or because their parents engage in episodic work. Small expansion to pilot program in **2024**.

2024: Expansion of the State General Fund investment in CCAP, with a FY 2025 state fund appropriation of \$997.14 million - compared to a FY 2024 general fund appropriation of \$459 million (increase of more than \$538 million)

2024: (Actively advocating) End New York's rule of tying child care assistance to parents' exact hours of work ("decoupling" bill is currently moving through the NYS Legislature)

Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) Copay Reduction

2021: No more than 10% of income above FPL (10% of income over \$27,750 for a family of 4)

2023: No more than 1% of income above FPL (1% of income over \$30,000 for a family of 4)

Market Rate Increase for Child Care Programs

2021: 69th percentile of the 2018 market rate

2022: 80th percentile of the 2021 market rate

Simplified attestation process for child care providers that do not serve private pay families to receive new market rate

System Improvement and Modernization

2022: Direct deposit of subsidy reimbursement checks for providers; to be implemented summer **2024**.

2023: Automatic income eligibility determination for families receiving government supports (SNAP, WIC, etc.)

2024: Online application for families to be implemented summer 2024
